Students arriving late and collecting early

If your child arrives at school after the 9:10am bell, you need to walk them into the office to explain why they are late to school. Please do not drop students off at the front gate and allow them to walk into the office alone.

If you need to collect your child from school early, please call the front office at least ½ hour before you are coming to collect your child so that we can make sure they are at the front office ready for when you arrive. Front office staff will not walk students out to cars, unless there are circumstances requiring this which will be at the front office and Principal's discretion.

To ensure student safety, the hall gate on Progress Place will now be locked each morning at 9:10am. We appreciate your support with this.

NAPLAN Information

Year 3 and Year 5 students will be completing the NAPLAN assessment this term during the testing window which starts on Wednesday 15th March and finishes on Friday 27th March 2023. We will be administering the NAPLAN assessments following the below schedule:

Wednesday 15th March - Writing
Thursday 16th March - Reading
Tuesday 21st March - Language Conventions
Thursday 23rd March - Numeracy

Catch up sessions have been scheduled throughout this week and the following week to cater for student absences.

Year 5 will be completing all assessments online and Year 3 will be completing all assessments online except for writing which remains paper based. School laptops will be used to complete all online assessments as they best support the technical requirements for the NAPLAN portal. We ask for all students to bring a set of headphones to school on Monday 13th March so they can be used during the assessments.

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NAPLAN Information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

NAPLAN is a national literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it's important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national standards and over time.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It doesn't replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Schools have transitioned from paper-based to computer-based assessments. All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

Online NAPLAN tests provide more precise results and are more engaging for students. One of the main benefits is tailored (or adaptive) testing, where the test presents questions which may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for everyone. ACARA supports inclusive testing so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, or our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

Parent Teacher Meetings

Bookings are now open to book a Parent Teacher meeting with your child's teacher through the Sentral Parent Portal. Parents and carers have until the 28th February to book through Sentral. The meetings will take place at the school from the 6th March – 24th March. Please make sure to make a booking as early as possible to avoid disappointment.

Please ensure you are prompt for your meeting as teachers have a 15-minute allocation for each booking and meetings will run back-to-back.

Learning and Support Team (LST)

Personalised Learning and Support Plan (PLSP) meetings for identified students in K-6 mainstream classes have been scheduled and parents notified. If you have had a PLSP meeting scheduled, please do not book a parent teacher meeting.

Expression of Interest for Year 6 transition in Year 7

Parents of students in Year 6 will receive an Expression of Interest (EOI) link on the 6th March 2023 to submit their High School enrolment information. By completing the EOI you indicate which high school(s) you intend on sending your child to for 2024.

This is the first year EOI's can be submitted online via the Garden Suburb Public School website from the 6^{th} – 31^{st} of March. Information on how to submit this information will be sent with the link. If parents would rather complete the EOI booklet these can be picked up at the office. Booklets will need to be returned it to the office by Friday 24^{th} March to give enough time to enter this information. We will review and pass on the EOI to your local high school, and if applicable, to your first preference school.

When completing the form, you will be required to provide your child's residential address. The office may contact you if there is any need for follow up.

If your child will not be attending an NSW Government high school in 2024, please notify the school via email. If you are unsure as you are planning to move interstate or enrolling into a private school, we ask that you still complete the EOI and advise GSPS once confirmation of enrolment elsewhere has been received.

The curriculum is a plan for learning based on mandated and approved syllabus documents and current departmental policies and procedures.

The NSW curriculum refers to the suite of resources that are the syllabuses and the support resources to support teachers to implement the syllabuses. This includes, but is not limited to, resources including teaching and learning advice, assessment resources, and syllabus-specific materials including scope and sequences, units of work, standards materials and work samples.

Each year, the students at Garden Suburb Public School will be taught subjects from the following syllabuses developed by the NSW Education Standards Authority:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science and Technology
- Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE) (History and Geography)
- Creative Arts
- Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE)

NSW syllabuses provide an outline of the requirements for teaching and learning in various subjects for stages of students' learning. They also contain the outcomes and content which are intended to be inclusive of the learning needs of all students, including:

- Aboriginal students
- students with disability
- high potential and gifted education
- students learning English as an additional language or dialect (EAL/D).

Our teaching and learning programs are carefully designed with the needs of your child at the core. Programs are adapted to cater for the needs of each student in the class. Our teachers use a range of high-quality resources to deliver innovative teaching and learning. Evidence-based teaching pedagogies are collaboratively explored and intentionally implemented in classrooms to enhance student learning outcomes and provide engaging learning activities.

At Garden Suburb Public School, we value the important role our parents and carers have in the educational journey of our students. Please contact the school should you have any questions or would like to discuss your child's specific learning needs.





The NSW education system is reforming the curriculum which will be taught in all classrooms from Kindergarten to Year 12. The new curriculum, as a result of the NSW Curriculum Reform, will give students more time to focus on key learning areas so that they can acquire a deeper understanding of central concepts. It will ensure students develop strong foundations for learning, life and work in a complex and fast-changing world.

This reform has been informed by extensive consultation with teachers, parents and education experts, and is underpinned by extensive research. Curriculum reform involves change that spans many aspects of schooling, including teaching, learning, assessment and reporting to parents. New syllabuses provide schools with a unique opportunity to refocus and place curriculum at the heart of school planning. Key curriculum changes include:

- building strong foundations for future learning with new English and mathematics syllabuses for Kindergarten to Year 2
- an entirely new curriculum from 2022 with new syllabuses focused on what is essential to know and do in early and middle years of schooling, and key learning areas in the senior years
- providing more time for teaching by reducing the hours teachers spend on extra-curricular topics and issues and compliance requirements
- strengthening post- school pathways with new learning areas for Years 11 and 12 that clearly link learning to future employment and study options.

The new curriculum will ensure every student develops strong foundations for learning, life and work. The reforms are vital for the young people in our schools today, and for those who will arrive in the years to come. Please see the attached fact sheet for parents in this newsletter for more information regarding the curriculum reform.

This year, Garden Suburb Public School is implementing the new K-2 English and Mathematics syllabuses in our K-2 classes. Next year we will see our school implementing the new 3-6 English and Mathematics syllabuses.

Staff enthusiastically engaged with extensive professional learning opportunities last year surrounding the evidence-base of the new syllabuses and continue to do so this year. Our careful preparation for the new K-2 syllabuses included liaising with our Cardiff Community of Schools to share best practice, K-2 staff observing schools where the new

syllabuses were being trialled, targeted curriculum planning days, developing explicit instructional teaching sequences and the strategic purchasing of evidence-informed literacy and numeracy resources. Currently, our K-2 classrooms are buzzing with learning as our K-2 teachers and students embark on this exciting educational change together.

In our future newsletters, we will be sharing snippets of our students and teachers engaging with the new curriculum, providing our school community with a 'window of vision' into the exciting initiatives our school undertakes this year.



Crossroads Zone Swimming Carnival




On Tuesday 4th April students will have their school photo taken. Please make sure students are dressed in full school uniform.

Orders Placed via QuickCliq

QuickCliq has not been able to implement on-the-spot processing of vouchers at the time of your order placement.
